
Job: Sin, Death & Resurrection

⁵ Students of the Bible observe that some teachings are *progressively* revealed with increasing content and clarity throughout the duration of the Bible. Like the gradual brightening of a dimmer switch, Job's hope in renewal from the dead (14:13-14; 19:25-27) gradually turned brighter in the Old Testament (Psalm 16:10; Isaiah 26:19; Daniel 12:2) until it climaxed with the full brightness of Jesus who claimed to be the resurrection and eternal life (John 11:25-26).


13²³ How many wrongs and sins have I committed?

Show me my offense and my sin.

- ²⁴ Why do you hide your face and consider me your enemy?
- ²⁵ Will you torment a windblown leaf? Will you chase after dry chaff?
- ²⁶ For you write down bitter things against me and make me reap the sins of my youth.
- You fasten my feet in shackles; you keep close watch on all my paths by putting marks on the soles of my feet.
- ²⁸ "So man wastes away like something rotten, like a garment eaten by moths.
- **14** "Mortals, born of woman, are of few days and full of trouble.
- ² They spring up like flowers and wither away; like fleeting shadows, they do not endure.
- ³ Do you fix your eye on them? Will you bring them before you for judgment?
- ⁴ Who can bring what is pure from the impure? No one!
- ⁵ A person's days are determined; you have decreed the number of his months and have set limits he cannot exceed.
- ⁶ So look away from him and let him alone, till he has put in his time like a hired laborer.
- ⁷ "At least there is hope for a tree: If it is cut down, it will sprout again, and its new shoots will not fail.
- ⁸ Its roots may grow old in the ground and its stump die in the soil,
- ⁹ yet at the scent of water it will bud and put forth shoots like a plant.
- ¹⁰ But a man dies and is laid low; he breathes his last and is no more.
- ¹¹ As the water of a lake dries up or a riverbed becomes parched and dry,
- 12 so he lies down and does not rise; till the heavens are no more, people will not awake or be roused from their sleep.
- ¹³ "If only you would hide me in the grave

- and conceal me till your anger has passed! If only you would set me a time and then remember me!
- 14 If someone dies, will they live again?All the days of my hard serviceI will wait for my renewal to come.
- ¹⁵ You will call and I will answer you; you will long for the creature your hands have made.
- ¹⁶ Surely then you will count my steps but not keep track of my sin.
- ¹⁷ My offenses will be sealed up in a bag; you will cover over my sin.
