saying, "Return to dust, you mortals."

<sup>4</sup> A thousand years in your sight  
are like a day that has just gone by,  
or like a watch in the night.

<sup>5</sup> Yet you sweep people away in the sleep of  
death—

they are like the new grass of the  
morning:

<sup>6</sup> In the morning it springs up new,  
but by evening it is dry and withered.

<sup>7</sup> We are consumed by your anger  
and terrified by your indignation.

<sup>8</sup> You have set our iniquities before you,  
our secret sins in the light of your  
presence.

<sup>9</sup> All our days pass away under your wrath;  
we finish our years with a moan.

<sup>10</sup> Our days may come to seventy years,  
or eighty, if our strength endures;  
yet the best of them are but trouble and  
sorrow,  
for they quickly pass, and we fly away.

<sup>11</sup> If only we knew the power of your anger!  
Your wrath is as great as the fear that  
is your due.

<sup>12</sup> Teach us to number our days,  
that we may gain a heart of wisdom.

<sup>13</sup> Relent, LORD! How long will it be?  
Have compassion on your servants.

<sup>14</sup> Satisfy us in the morning with your  
unfailing love,

that we may sing for joy and be glad  
all our days.

<sup>15</sup> Make us glad for as many days as you  
have afflicted us,  
for as many years as we have seen  
trouble.

<sup>16</sup> May your deeds be shown to your  
servants,  
your splendor to their children.

on us;  
establish the work of our hands for  
us—  
yes, establish the work of our hands.

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
